Notes on Activities of 2-1 and 2-2-36

In two sessions we sat with the Chicago Quarterly Meeting in full freedom. We recessed for Tea. We ate together in Woolman Hall, a joint committee sitting together to formulate letters, now requested by both bodies. The evening session was devoted to a discussion of Coöperatives, an illuminating statement of the subject being made by Jones. He says the idea is receiving wide and practical acceptance. One has been opened in Hyde Park. The letters were approved and about 50 copies are to be prepared and mailed.

Sunday during the meeting for worship there were three messages. The Forum was addressed by Albert T. Mills, subject: The Religion of Kagawa. A considerable discussion followed.

The weather was cold tho free from snow or rain. Snow and ice made walking far from pleasant. Severities of weather prevented some friends from getting to the meetings, home requiring their presence. No report is at hand from Highland Creek. Laura Smith and Mildred and Barbary Whitney are present from the Clear Creek meeting.

In our moments of worship Saturday reference was made to St. John De Nepumos (St. John Who Wouldn't Talk), the name of a church in Milwaukee and of a man of Prague a long time ago.
